Week 10: Paul and Conflict Resolution in the Community

1. Overview

- 1) Paul faced various conflicts within early Christian communities ranging from doctrinal disagreements and ethical issues to leadership divisions and social tensions.
- 2) Rooted in the truth of the gospel, Paul sought to resolve these conflicts with pastoral wisdom, aiming for unity and maturity in the body of Christ.
- 3) This session explores Paul's conflict-resolution strategies through real cases in Corinth, Galatia, and Philippi.

2. Key Texts

- 1) 1 Corinthians 1:10-17- Division and factions; solution through the centrality of the cross
- 2) Galatians 2:11-14- Paul's confrontation with Peter over gospel truth
- 3) Philippians 4:2-3- Mediation between Euodia and Syntyche (leadership conflict)

3. Main Causes of Conflict

- 1) Doctrinal misunderstanding (Legalism vs. Freedom)
- 2) Leadership-centered divisions (e.g., "I follow Paul," "I follow Apollos")
- 3) Ethical and moral issues (e.g., sexual immorality, lawsuits)
- 4) Social and cultural tensions (e.g., slaves vs. free, Jews vs. Gentiles)

4. Paul's Principles of Conflict Resolution

- 1) Gospel-Centered Resolution- Emphasis on grace and unity in the cross
- 2) Balance of Truth and Love- "Speak the truth in love" (Ephesians 4:15)
- 3) Community-Building Ethic-"All things are permissible, but not all things are beneficial" (1 Cor. 10:23)
- 4) Leadership with Authority and Humility- Reproof and encouragement side by side (cf. Pastoral Epistles)
- 5) Restorative Discipline-Discipline as a tool for repentance and restoration (cf. 1 Cor. 5)

5. Practical Applications

1) Paul did not avoid conflict but faced it head on to nurture the community.

- 2) The church must evaluate and resolve conflicts based on gospel truth.
- 3) Remember: Peace without truth is hypocrisy; truth without love is brutality.
