1) Course Overview)

- (1) This course offers hands-on training in reading and interpreting the Greek text of the New Testament.
 - (2) Students will explore selected passages—especially from the Pauline Epistles and the Gospels—to grasp the original meaning through close study of grammar, vocabulary, and context.

 - 3) Develop deeper understanding of biblical interpretation through original texts
