2. Overview of the Bible's Composition

Division Number of Books Summary Description

Old Testament 39 books History from creation to the promise of the Messiah New Testament 27 books The gospel of Jesus Christ and the church age

Total: 66 books, written over ~1,500 years by more than 40 authors.

3. Structure of the Old Testament

Category	Books	Examples	Summary Description
Pentateuch (Law)	5	Genesis to Deuteronomy	Creation, humanity, sin, Israel's origins
Historical Books	12	Joshua to Esther	The history of the people of Israel
Wisdom Literature	5	Job, Psalms, Proverbs	Poetry, wisdom, and worship
Major Prophets	5	Isaiah to Daniel	Judgment and hope for Israel and nations
Minor Prophets	12	Hosea to Malachi	Messages of repentance and restoration

4. Structure of the New Testament

Category	Books	Examples	Summary Description
Gospels	4	Matthew to John	Life and ministry of Jesus Christ
Historical Book	1	Acts	Birth and expansion of the early church
Pauline Epistles	13	Romans to Philemon	Doctrinal teachings and church instructions
General Epistles	8	Hebrews to Jude	Exhortations to the church and believers
Prophetic Book	1	Revelation	Eschatological visions and Christ's second coming

5. Unity of the Bible's Structure

- 1) One central theme: The Kingdom of God and redemptive history
- 2) Central figure: Jesus Christ
- 3) Redemptive Connection:
 - (1) The Old Testament foreshadows Christ.
 - (2) The New Testament fulfills and explains that promise.

6. Application and Reflection

- 1) Read each book of the Bible with an awareness of its place in the overall structure.
- 2) Observe how God has worked through history to fulfill His redemptive

plan.
