Week 5: The Law and the Gospel

1. Introduction: The Tension and Harmony between Law and Gospel

- 1) The Law and the Gospel are not opposites in redemptive history but represent two distinct modes of God's revelation.
- 2) The Law reveals sin, while the Gospel is the power of God for salvation from sin (Romans 3:20, Romans 1:16).

2. The Threefold Use of the Law

1) Mirror Function:

Reveals human sin and God's holiness (Romans 3:20).

2) Restraint Function:

Restrains evil and maintains order in society (1 Timothy 1:9).

3) Guide Function:

Provides moral guidance for the sanctified life of the believer (Romans 7:12, Psalm 119).

3. The Function of the Gospel

- 1) The Gospel fulfills the righteousness demanded by the Law through Jesus Christ, imputing righteousness to those who believe (Romans 10:4).
- 2) It is the power of God for salvation by grace through faith (Ephesians 2:8-9).

4. Paul's View of the Law

- 1) Paul does not deny the goodness of the Law (Romans 7:12), but he declares that no one is justified by the Law (Galatians 2:16).
- 2) The Law serves as a tutor (Greek: *paidagogos*) that leads us to Christ (Galatians 3:24).

5. Legalism and Antinomianism

1) Legalism:

Attempts to gain salvation through obedience to the Law — this denies the Gospel.

2) Antinomianism:

Rejects the Law under the pretense of grace—this denies sanctification.

3) Paul refutes both errors, teaching that those saved by grace fulfill the righteous requirement of the Law through the Spirit (Romans 8:4).

6. The New Covenant and the Law

- 1) The New Covenant foretold in Jeremiah 31:31-34 writes the Law on believers' hearts.
- 2) Through the Spirit, the Law is internalized and leads to willing obedience (Hebrews 10:16, Romans 8:2).

Summary

- 1) The Law cannot save, but the Gospel fulfills what the Law demands.
- 2) The Gospel frees us from the curse of the Law and leads us into the law of the Spirit of life in Christ (Galatians 3:13, Romans 8:2).
- 3) Paul acknowledges the true function of the Law while proclaiming the superiority and freedom found in the Gospel.
